

MESSAGE FROM THE BISHOP _____



Has the church has lost its coin? Bishop Dr J.V Hlatshwako took to the stage to share a power message on dealing with loss and pain, explaining why it is crutial to deal with it and how. He further taught about the difference between being right and being Righteous. The Bishop then referenced biblical examples that demonstrate just how to deal with lose and pain the right way, which is as follows:



1. THE LOST SHEEP

In the parable of the lost sheep, Jesus paints the image of a shepherd leaving his ninety-nine sheep to search for the one that has gone astray. Sheep naturally follow, and their safety lies in staying close to their shepherd. When a sheep gets lost, it often isn't because of rebellion sometimes because of distraction or drifting.

This teaches us that being led is vital, and following the Shepherd (Jesus) is a spiritual discipline we must develop. When a sheep cries out in its lostness, the shepherd hears. That cry represents vulnerability, and desperation. The Shepherd's heart is moved to respond, and He searches until the sheep is found. Our responsibility is to stay close to the

2. THE LOST COIN

In the cultural context, the ten silver coins often formed part of a woman's dowry or headpiece, symbolizing identity, dignity, and status. To lose a coin was to lose part of oneself. The woman lights a lamp and sweeps the house carefully. The lamp symbolizes the Word of God, which shines light into dark, hidden places of our lives. The broom represents intercession the intentional, sweeping movement of prayer that uncovers what is missing.

Sometimes, we lose valuable dimensions as individuals, families, or even churches. Joy, peace, purpose, or anointing may go missing. When that happens, we must search with intentionality. Not all losses cry out like the sheep. Not all walk away like the son. Some things are lost quietly, and we only notice when we feel the emptiness.

3. THE LOST SON

Unlike the sheep, the lost son is not led astray but chooses to leave. He demands his inheritance and walks away from his father's house, driven by self-will, worldly influences, or personal ambition. The father, full of love and wisdom, does not chase the son but waits.

A son who is forced back may not yet have learned; but a son who comes to his senses, like the prodigal did in the pigpen, returns with humility and a changed heart. This parable reminds us that God honors free will, but never closes the door. His arms are always open and he rejoices upon every son's return.


1 REST IN CHRIST MEDIA TEAM

The Bishop encouraged attendees by highlighting that the things we desire in life must be fought for.


Although God may have spoken certain promises over us, it is still our responsibility to actively pursuethem.

Bishop J.V. Hlatjwako taught on the need to actively seek outinformation and eliminate spiritual and mental stagnation.

He noted that laziness is often the entrypoint into the difficult positions we find ourselves in.

Referencing the Song of Solomon chapter 2,the Bishop urged the women to mind the 'little foxes' symbolic of small compromises or negligences that eventually lead to great damage.

He explained that it is not the big issues that usually destroy us, but rather the small, often overlooked things. To live a distinguished and fulfilled life, one must pay close attention to the small details.

JUNIOR YOUTH CONFERENCE HIGHLIGHTS

Friday The session addressed the importance of accepting godly answers and learning from biblical figures like David. The youth were taught to avoid bitterness and anger, especially towards theirparents.

It was pointed out that sometimes God withholds certain things to help us grow incharacter and trust.

David was highlighted as a young man who accepted that he was not his father's favourite, butstill submitted to God's plan for his life.

Theme: Purity - was defined as a heart that is clean from hatred, envy, pride, and sinful desires.

Various types of purity were discussed:

1. Heart Purity Definition: A heart that is clean from hatred, envy, pride, and sinful desires. "Blessed are the pure in heart, for they shall see God." – Matthew 5:8

How to Maintain:

- Regular self-examination (Psalm 139:23-24)- Prayer for a clean heart (Psalm 51:10)-Forgiving others and removing bitterness

2. Spiritual Purity

Definition: Worshiping God in truth and without idolatry or hypocrisy. "God is spirit, and his worshipers must worship in spirit and in truth." – John 4:24

How to Maintain:

- Reading and living by the Word (John 17:17) Avoiding false teachings and spiritual distractions
- Being filled with the Holy Spirit (Galatians 5:16)3. Thought

PurityDefinition: Keeping the mind free from lust, or impure imaginations. "Whatever is pure...think about these things." – Philippians 4:8

How to Maintain:

- Guarding what you watch, read, or listen to- Taking every thought captive to Christ (2 Corinthians 10:5)
- 4. Body Purity (Sexual Purity) Definition: Honoring God with your body and avoiding sexual sin." Flee from sexual immorality...your body is a temple of the Holy Spirit." 1 Corinthians

How to Maintain:

- Avoiding lustful environments
- Having accountability partners
- Remembering your body is God's dwelling
